COLLABORATIVE APPROACH SOUGHT TO DERAIL ONGOING DAMAGE IN JACK MORGAN PARK

ANTI-SOCIAL behaviour, littering and damage to public amenities are some of the repeated issues being reported by members of the public about Jack Morgan Park in Coolum.

The western part of the park which features the community garden, the new amenities block and the covered picnic table is the area where the near weekly damage is being reported and excessive littering is being observed almost daily.

All stakeholders responsible for management of the park and ensuring public safety including Council, Coolum Police and Ninderry

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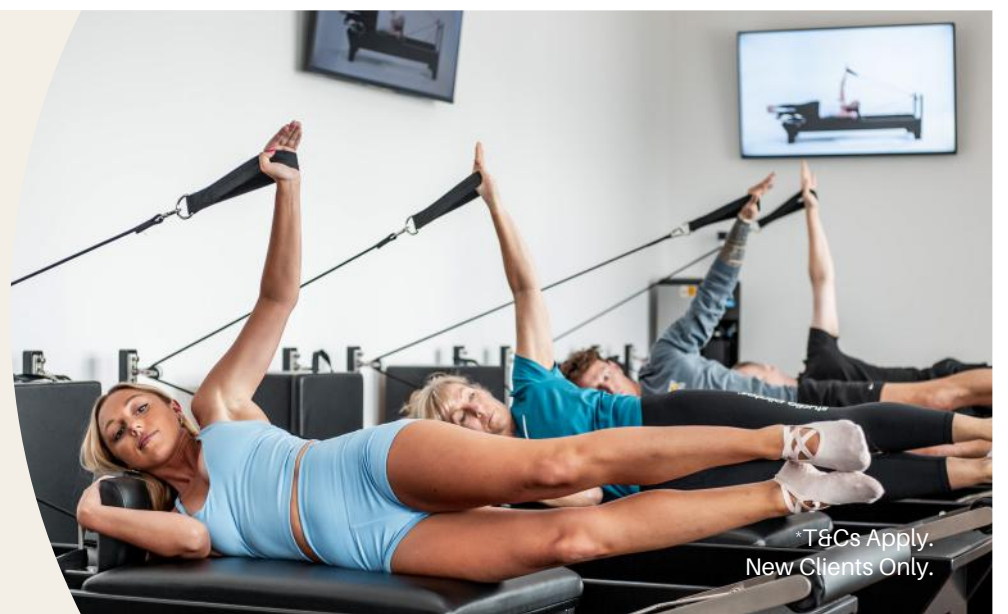

MP Dan Purdie are aware of the issues in the park.

Division 9 Councillor Maria Suarez said that Council has received complaints from residents and reports of destructive behaviour.

"Council have not identified the individual/s responsible," Cr Suarez said.

Council is managing the situation as best they can on a daily basis.

"Litter is being cleaned up, graffiti is being removed and damage is being repaired. However, all of these remedies are accumulated costs that are then funded through general rates."

Long term action and what that entails is being looked at in an effort to reclaim the peace of the park.

"I am coordinating a meeting with myself, Council staff, Dan Purdie Minister for Police and member for Ninderry, and Coolum Police to discuss collective efforts

to address the undesirable behaviour occurring in Jack Morgan Park," Cr Suarez said.

Dan Purdie MP said that he would be working on solutions with the other parties.

"Local residents have raised serious concerns about anti-social behaviour in Jack Morgan Park over recent months," Mr Purdie said.

"Examples include misuse of e-scooter and e-bikes, vandalism and destruction of community property including public toilet facilities, drug use, intimidation and aggression directed toward vulnerable residents. Sadly, young people are overrepresented in these reports."

Mr Purdie said that the use of e-mobility devices appeared to correlate with the rise in issues being reported.

"The rapid uptake and popularity of personal mobility devices such e-scooters and e-skateboards, as well as e-bikes has certainly been a factor in many complaints.

There are significant penalties for their misuse, and it is important to note that there is a big difference between legal and illegal e-bikes, the latter causing most of the reported safety issues."

Mr Purdie reinforced the importance of the community reporting any issues to ensure priority.

"Coolum Police are currently patrolling the park at random times of the day as part of their daily operations.

"This is in response to the high volumes of complaints being reported. Police use the information they receive to target their response, so it is important for locals to report to Policelink on 131 444 or Crimestoppers on 1800 333 000."

Mr Purdie said that he would be working closely with both Council and Police to find a solution to the issues in the park.

"The installation of CCTV cameras is on the agenda for discussion at our next meet-

ing, and I understand Cr Suarez is weighing up the cost of recurrent property damage as part of Council's deliberations."

Councillor Suarez furthered these statements and said that it was the right of the community to expect to feel safe in the park.

"Safe, inclusive public spaces are important and essential for communities," Cr Suarez said.

"Surveillance and enforcement are what the broader community are expecting. These measures will be considered as well as exploring other potential solutions."

Coolum Police were contacted for comment, however they did not get back before our publication deadline.

The Advertiser will follow up on this story after the meeting with the stakeholders mentioned.

FORMER Championship Tour standout and World No. 2 Julian Wilson recently announced he'd be making a comeback to competitive surfing, and he got his campaign off to a great start securing a win in Newcastle in super fun, clean surf in the two-to-three-foot range.

Julian took out the EJE Pro as part of Newcastle Surfest - a World Surf League Qualifying Series event, with the win secured on Saturday March 15.

Julian hasn't competed

since 2022, however he looked sharp all week, posting some of the highest single wave scores of each round, to eventually find his way to the Final, where he came up against Axel Curotta.

After Wilson took an early lead, the youngster Curotta moved back in front and left Wilson chasing a score for the majority of the heat until the last few minutes, where his experience paid off, and he utilised priority to earn the score and win with a two-

wave total of 13.70 (out of a possible 20).

Julian said that the event had been really fun.

"This is the last event I won five years ago, so it's cool to be back as I step back into competing.

"Thanks to all the crowd funders for supporting it and to the local community who always gets right behind it, as well as to Warren Smith for putting it on."

Hailing from Coolum and still regularly spotted around

town, Julian now lives in Newcastle these days.

"There have been some great waves throughout the window, so it's just been such a cool experience. It's so nice to do it at home with my family and my kids down on the beach. I love being a part of this community, so thank you to Newcastle."

FIXING E-BIKE SAFETY

An easy solution for Sunshine Coast Council to increase road safety for e-bike and e-scooter users, would be

to make them legal to use on suburban roads - providing safe passage for pedestrians needing to walk roads with no footpaths.

On suburban roadways with the current posted speed limit of 60kmph, reduce the posted speed limit to 50kmph. Do it on all council suburban roads not just a select few.

On roads with a centre line create actual segregated bike way lanes suitable for e-bikes and pedestrians who need to walk on the roadway.

This would be an important road safety issue, reduces the risk of interaction between electric bikes, scooters and road users, and makes policing easier.

BUSH CARERS PEREGIAN BEACH

Open/Field Day

MY WIFE and I have been volunteer Bush Carers at Peregian Beach since 1997 and we would love to see the community come along to the Open/Field Day at Beach Access 50 on March 29.

Basket Asparagus (*Asparagus aethiopicus*) has been a particular nemesis for us and most other Bush Carers. It has overwhelmed vast areas of bushland and in places is almost a monoculture. Removing mature plants requires a lot of physical effort and a range of tools including - mattocks (small and large), blades (serrated and sharp) and peter levers.

With our advancing age and health issues I realised mechanical assistance was required to outcompete this

class three weed of national significance.

In 2019 the concept of a cordless drill powered tool started to emerge. After many iterations and interruptions there are now 13 "Asparagus Assassins" being used by volunteers across Noosa Bush Care groups. The difference the "AA" makes is readily evident.

Its success has heartened the spirit of volunteers in seeing Basket Asparagus diminish and holding hope of native vegetation regenerating.

There will be several "AAs" available at the Open/Field Day for potential volunteers to experience under the guidance from a team of operators.

We hope to see you there and share the love of volunteering with Noosa Bushcare at Peregian Beach.

picked, it was always somewhat known about.

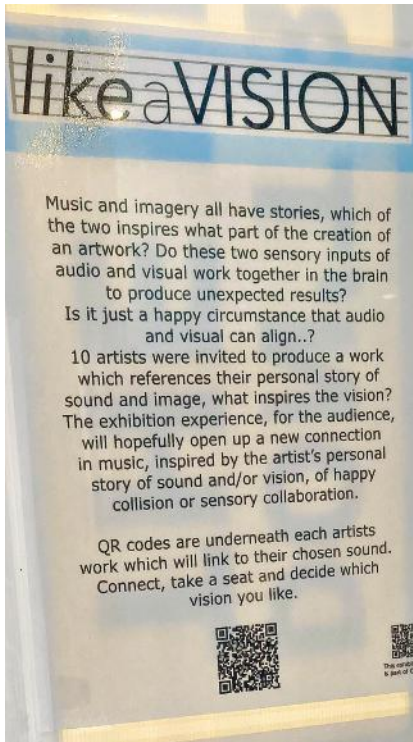
"We knew about the windows and were looking through the gaps, trying to work out what was in there and the body corporate here have kindly allowed us access and its really perfect,"

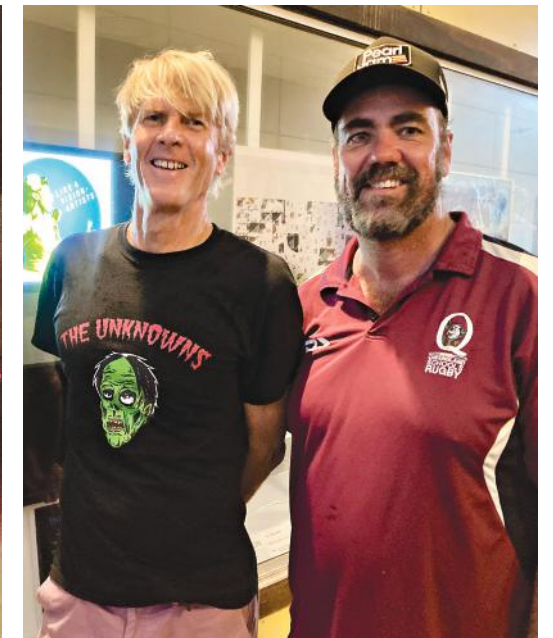

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NO TIME FOR SCAMMERS

LAST YEAR, I had to locate and write to six people in central Europe, who were named as beneficiaries in a Queensland will.

"Hi, there. You don't know me, but you have been left money in a Queensland will".

It looked like a scam from their end, didn't it?

Eventually, I broke through the barriers of identity, language and scepticism to distribute the six gifts.

Then I received this week a similar such letter from a United Kingdom address. The letter was slim and expensively produced. It had preprinted Royal Mail franking and a return address - no number.

It came from a man, who said that he was with a Hong Kong bank. The man claimed he had about \$28 million US dollars for me and proceeded to explain why.

I stopped reading.

In no conceivable universe will any friend or relation leave \$28 million to me. Besides, I wouldn't know what to do with it if they did.

The street name on the envelope is a residential street in Yorkshire, but no number is given. An international telephone number and two similar email addresses are listed as contacts.

A reader will make a fatal error if they telephone or email in response to this letter. That is what the writer wants. He or she will then ask for a downpayment on the fake services or ask for banking details, to empty an account.

On closer inspection, I noticed the letter was addressed to Rory Baker, not Ray Barber. This was the final nail in the coffin. A robot program had trawled a database to link "Rory Baker" and my PO Box.

Coolum residents should not let loneliness or wishful thinking draw them into communications with scammers such as my so-called Yorkshire banker.

If you receive such an approach in an email, read the sender's email address right to left, starting with the country code. If it is not "au" or is missing altogether, this is a bad sign. If the rest of the address seems strange to you, ignore the email.

Don't give the scammers any oxygen!

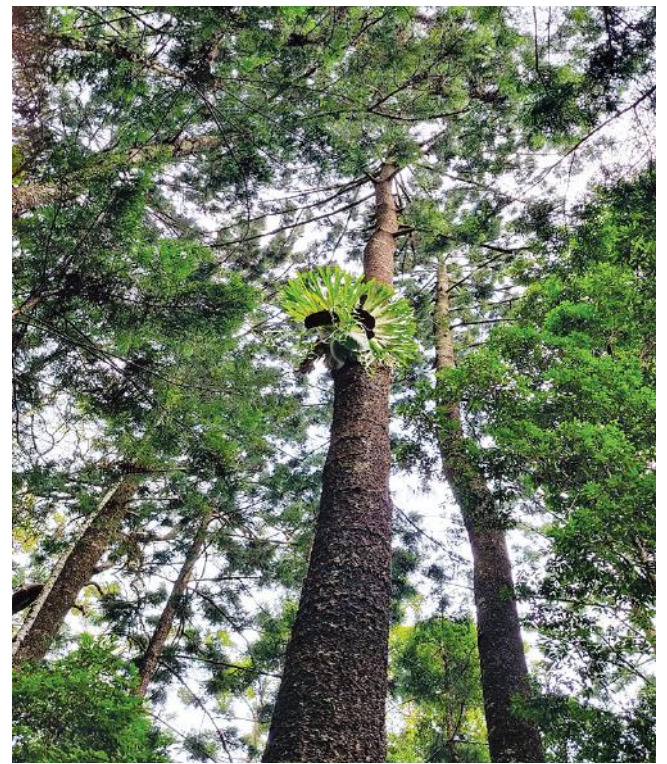
Well, the deadly experience will continue as long as we put an effort into retaining our native vegetation and retaining those places that enhance our soul journey in life.

WOMEN'S ECONOMIC SECURITY

Who are the inspiring women in our lives who lift us up, encourage and create pathways for others to live their best lives?

I've also known some outstanding, good men who provide this servant leadership approach to unlocking opportunity and personal development of those around them regardless of gender, but it is important to give a special shoutout to the women who have and still do fulfil this role in our lives. Too often their stories aren't told or recognised and the power to change that is in our hands.

For me, my mum Norma is one of my heroines. Born in the Depression era, losing her father at a young age where money was tight and opportunities for girls weren't easily identified, her feisty and insightful view on the world continues to challenge and inspire me. It was also the story of her mother - my grandmother - who was widowed suddenly and left to provide for and raise four young children which formed my mother's outlook. This in turn influenced my own views and passion about the need for women to have economic security. It's a longer story, and many women have different versions of the challenges they and their families have faced, but the short version is that unfortunately there are those who can take financial advantage of people's economic vulnerability rather than helping.

Empowering women to be more financially literate and in charge of their economic future is a significant issue.

As part of Queensland Women's Week, I recently released the first Women's Economic Security and Wellbeing Report. The report is an important insight into the lives of women and girls in Queensland and is part of the Queensland Government's commitment for positive pathways to helping women thrive wherever they live. It provides a snapshot that highlights the barriers and challenges women and girls face in Queensland hindering their economic security and wellbeing, and where further action is needed.

Importantly the report will inform the first Women's Economic Security Strategy which I will be taking out for public consultation to be written for women and by women to identify opportunities for change. It

will be integrated across government to help address barriers in health, housing, safety, justice, education, employment, and training, including the consideration for the overlays for women with diverse backgrounds and experiences.

As the Minister for Women and Women's Economic Security I am committed to delivering accelerated actions across a number of these areas and working with government, community and business to better support women.

Why does it matter?

For example, 15.4% of women retire with no personal income. The fastest growing cohort of homelessness is women aged over 55 and one in seven women (of all ages) are living under the poverty line in Australia.

I want to see women have equal opportunities and to be able to thrive and do well, which is good for themselves but also their families and the community.

I welcome you to join me on the journey to getting better outcomes that help women and girls, and our community do well. If you have any questions in relation to the report, please let me know as I am happy to talk with you.

A look back in time

A LONG TIME COOLUM RESIDENT WITH A PASSION FOR LOCAL HISTORY



MONKEY BUSINESS IN EARLY COOLUM

HAVE YOU watched TV today? ... Or talked to your distant friends or relatives on your phone? Have you gathered with a group of mates for fun, or travelled to Maroochydore, Noosa or Nambour, just for pleasurable entertainment? None of these activities would have been available in the early days of Coolum, when any chances for pleasant entertainment would have been very few and far between.

A century or more ago, life in Coolum was hard work, with few chances for entertainment. However, long before all of those contact methods became possible, or popular, one very early selector provided excitement for the people of Coolum and other areas.

Robert Coe – originally a grazier and selector of land in the Conondale district, near Gympie - was one of the first timber-getters at Coolum, where he selected an area of just under 100 acres [nearly 44 hectares] at the north-west corner of Mount Coolum, roughly in the area where the West Coolum Road bridge crosses today's motorway.

That land, which was registered as Portion 168V, and granted to him on March 31, 1891, as an Agricultural Farm Lease now encompasses the area at the southern end

of South Coolum Road, between Mount Coolum and the motorway [where the first School of Arts - which was used as a dance hall, a library and also the only school from 1917 until 1930] was situated.

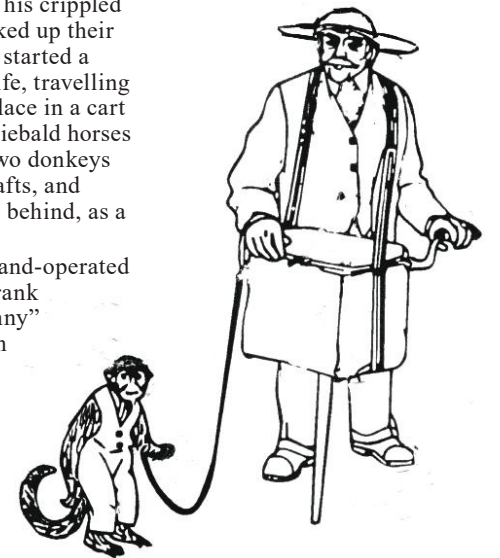
With the help of James Donnelly, Robert Coe dragged timber through Portion 93 to the wharf on Coolum Creek, from where it was rafted to William Pettigrew's sawmill, established near the mouth of the Maroochy River in 1891. After two years, though, Bob Coe forfeited his lease on June 12, 1893, and the land was reselected by Patricia Jutsham Nicholls on August 7, 1893.

Bob Coe and his crippled father then packed up their belongings and started a very different life, travelling from place to place in a cart pulled by two piebald horses in front, with two donkeys between the shafts, and another donkey behind, as a spare one.

They had a hand-operated organ, which cranked out very "tinny" music with each circuit of the handle, and ... a performing monkey that travelled with them!

What pleasure must have been experienced by all those quiet country children, when "Bob Coe" and his rag-tag band came into sight, attended by their horses, their donkeys, a hand organ which provided fascinating [if, most likely very "tinny"] music – and a monkey! It has been said that as the strangely musical group proceeded through the district, they provided "a great treat for Aboriginal and white children.

I wonder how this entertainment compares with today's gadgetry!

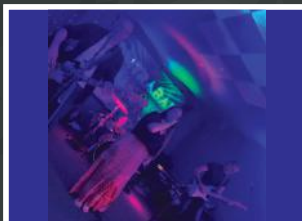

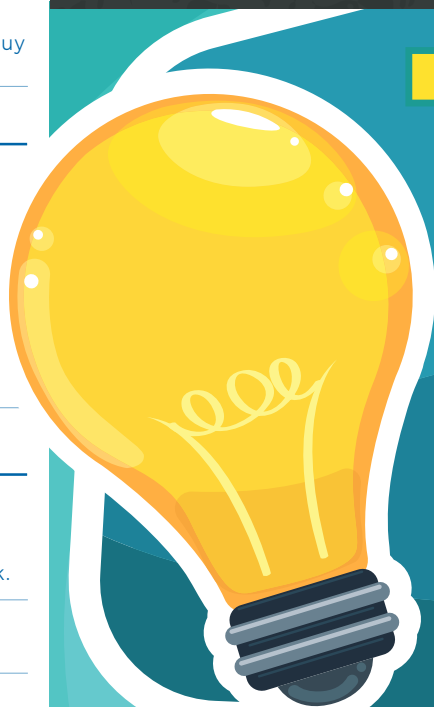
